Masaki Inaba (Co-chairs and Director of Global Health Program, Africa Japan Forum)

After working on poverty issues and LGBT human rights in the 1990s, Masaki Inaba has been working on AIDS and health issues of Africa as the Director of the Global Health Program of Africa-Japan Forum since 2002. After leading the NGO Network for the Achievement of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), he led in the establishment of the Japan Civil Society Network on SDGs in 2017. He served a member of the SDGs Promotion Round Table, as well as the Expert Task Force on the Global Health Strategy, that are the official advisory mechanisms on SDGs and global health for the Government of Japan. He is co-author of "SDGs: A Compass for an Age of Crisis" (Iwanami Shinsho, 2020).



Atsuo Kishimoto (Professor, D3 Center, Osaka University)

He graduated from Kyoto University with a Ph.D. (Economics) degree in 1998. He has worked for the National Institute of Advanced Industrial Science and Technology (AIST) from 1998 to 2014, specialized in the risk assessment and economic analysis of environmental, safety and health regulations. He moved to the University of Tokyo in 2014 as a project professor at the Graduate School of Public Policy (GraSPP). Then, he moved to the University of Osaka in 2017. He works for the Institute for Datability Science(2024- D3 Center) and Research Center on Ethical, Legal and Social Issues, Osaka University. His research focuses on addressing risks stemming from ethical, legal, and social issues (ELSI) accompanying research and development of emerging technologies.



Ayako Takemi (Associate Professor, The Research Center for Advanced Science and Technology, UTokyo)

Dr. Ayako Takemi, MPH, PhD, is an associate professor at the University of Tokyo's Research Center for Advanced Science and Technology (RCAST), where she leads the Global Consensus-Making Policy Lab. Her research examines global coordination, consensus-building, and implementation to address transnational challenges in global health policy and health-security. She also evaluates policies to strengthen science and technology capabilities, with emphasis on economic security. She consulted for WHO and the World Bank and worked at McKinsey & Company. She holds a PhD in law from the University of Tokyo and an MPH from Harvard School of Public Health.
